The Coverlet Project began when we heard of a similar project from one of our former Guild members who had moved to another state. The local guild there was in the midst of an exchange coverlet project so she told us about it because it was such a wonderful idea. Not only was it a great idea, but it fit into all of Portland Handweavers Guild's plans for 1985. The Guild's Theme of the Year was "Webs Beneath Our Roof" and the Northwest Association of Weavers Conference theme was "Weaving: Learning and Sharing". Best of all it gave us a way to commemorate the Fortieth Anniversary of Portland Handweavers Guild.

Although we borrowed the idea for the project, all the details for our coverlets originated with our own committee. All of the patterns in this booklet were chosen and adapted specifically for the project including an original name draft.

With seventeen weavers participating in the project, it was a wonderful opportunity to share with our fellow weavers, to learn many new tricks and hints, to be involved in a group project, to meet and get to know other members of our Guild and to weave on a tight time schedule! On January 21, 1985, the yarn was distributed with all the drafts and instructions. We kept in contact with each other and helped, encouraged, and sympathized along the way. We all finished by the deadline! Eleven weeks later, on April 9, 1985, we had a potluck party and exchanged the squares. They were all beautiful!

The participants had woven 15 to 17 squares in their own pattern but in the various colors chosen by the other weavers. In addition, we each wove a square using 3/2 perle cotton for weft for a block to be made into a tablecloth. An eighteenth block was woven in a free form technique showing the "40" motif. These 18 blocks were then assembled into a tablecloth to commemorate the

SPECIFIC DETAILS

WARP: 10/2 perle cotton (Pearly Perle from Cotton Clouds)

WEFT-TABBY: 10/2 perle cotton

WEFT-PATTERN: 3 ply wool (Nehalem from Oregon Worsted Co.)

SETT: 20 ends per inch

WIDTH OF WARP: In the reed - 20 inches/400 ends

REED: 10 dent sleyed 2 ends per dent 12 dent sleyed 2,2,1 ends per dent 15 dent sleyed 2,1,1 ends per dent 8 dent sleyed 3,2 ends per dent

LENGTH OF WARP: Depends on number of blocks to be woven.

THREADING DRAFT: Adapted to the specific projects 400 ends per width as follows: Twill selvedges of 20 ends on each side with pattern section of 360 ends. See general draft and specific drafts for details.

TIEUP: The individual threading drafts show the tieup for sinking shed looms. Standard tieup as follows can be used:

sinking shed x
rising shed o
tabby on treadles 5 & 6

TREADLING: Unless otherwise indicated "tromp as writ" or weave "as drawn in".

Alternate appropriate tabby between each pattern weft. See general instructions for further information.

PICKS PER INCH: 19/20 plain weave. 19/20 tabby weft plus 19/20 pattern weft.



SPECIAL NOTES: Very important to the success of your project are the following: Sample before beginning the project even to include washing to determine shrinkage. Maintain an even beat, monitoring it constantly. Use other methods of control such as the 45 degree angle, weaving to square, etc. Refer to any of the references in the Bibliography. Take into consideration the final method of finishing.

WARP CALCULATIONS: Allow at least 10% for takeup and 9% for shrinkage in washing-beyond the finished length. Also, add the loom waste and allow extra for sampling.

WEFT CALCULATIONS: Plan to allow 10% for draw in and 9% for shrinkage in washing.

READING THE THREADING DRAFT: Begin on the right reading from right to left and end on the left. The number of repeats will be indicated by a number X with an arrow marking the beginning and end of the repeat \leftarrow ?X \longrightarrow . Drafts continued onto a second and third line also read from right to left. Some drafts will reverse to the beginning. All twill borders follow the general conformation of the design.


THREADING THE HEDDLES: With one end per heddle, count off units, blocks and/or repeats for easier threading. Check for errors in small units often and run a double check--even a triple check-- before making the corrections.

READING THE TREADLING SEQUENCE: With most drafts being treadled "as drawn in" or "tromp as writ" on a sinking shed tie-up, read from top to bottom. Repeat as indicated by the number X and arrow again marking the beginning and end of a repeat. Weave a plain weave heading or seam allowance as desired followed by a twill border area, the pattern area, and ending with twill border and plain weave seam allowance. If treadling must continue into a second column, again read from top to bottom. Note: some drafts are treadled rose fashion. For more information on rose fashion treadling refer to The Weaving Book by Helen Bress, p. 236-237. Remember to alternate the appropriate tabby wefts between pattern wefts. (It may help to always enter the same tabby from the same side using the same treadle, i.e. right hand treadle with shot entering on the right of the shed.)

If any group wishes to do a friendship coverlet or to weave other projects from these drafts, we will be more than happy to suggest, recommend, troubleshoot and answer any inquiries. We would like to hear of any projects resulting from these drafts or from anyone who has done a similar project.



MATERIALS AND SOURCES

For the Coverlets:

Perle cotton 10/2 (Pearly Perle) in white (4200 yards per pound on 3/4 pound cones) from Cotton Clouds. Route 2, Desert Hills # 16. Safford, Arizona 85546 Ph: (602) 428-7000. 3 cones per weaver at \$9.00 = \$27.00 plus postage cost \$28.05.* Three cones were adequate for 13 yards warp and tabby weft for at least 17 squares with approximately 1.5 ounces used per square for warp and weft. (Do samples for your own project.)

Three-ply wool (Nehalem) in colors (270 yards per 2 ounce tube) from Oregon Worsted Co. P. O. Box 02098. 8000 S. E. McLoughlin Blvd. Portland, OR 97202 Ph: (503) 236-1234. Two packages (16 tubes total) per weaver for each color at \$11.75 each. Cost \$23.50,* with a 2 or tube being ample for one 19 inch by 19 inch block with approximately 1.5 oz. being used.

For the Tablecloth:

Perle cotton 3/2 (Pearly Perle) in natural (1260 yards per pound on $1\frac{1}{4}$ pound cones) from Cotton Clouds. Three $1\frac{1}{4}$ pound cones at \$15.00 per cone = \$45.00 plus postage cost \$46.20 for weft only.* With 18 squares being woven for the tablecloth project, the total cost of materials for squares ran about \$76.00. (Lining and labels not included.)

*We appreciate being able to purchase from the above two firms at bulk rate prices for our Coverlet Project. Costs are based on early 1985 prices that have now increased.



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The idea to share these coverlet drafts with everyone came about as part of the theme, WEAVERS: LEARNING & SHARING, for the Association of Northwest Weavers 1985 Conference at Tacoma, Washington. When Portland Handweavers Guild members heard of the Coverlet Project, they requested copies of all the drafts woven. Thus, we decided to print the drafts in a bound booklet format to fulfill those requests and to document the project.
