Hello Salem Fiberarts Guild Partners,

I hope you are all healthy and doing well! I am really missing everyone and am so eager and looking forward to opening up again. However, as you know, we cannot open our doors until the Governor tells us we can safely do so. As always, you are welcome to contact me at any time. at <u>michellec@willametteheritage.org</u>. I am in the office almost every day, usually in the morning until early afternoon, but check emails constantly.

A few updates:

- 1. WHC has received the Paycheck Protection Program funds from the CARES Act. What that means is that we have been able to have all of our staff come back to their pre-Covid jobs. If on site, they will practice social distancing, will have personal protective equipment, and are encouraged to work from home as they are able. The facility staff will also be working on much needed projects around the site to prepare it for re-opening when we are safely able to do so.
- 2. Visitors to the site we have to stick with the state's orders regarding museum admissions and rental spaces and cannot welcome visitors back on our site until we are given the "okay" from the Governor's office. As we get closer to that day, I will be in touch again to let you know what the WHC protocol will be for visitors (i.e. social distancing guidelines on the museum site, expectations of tenants, etc).
- 3. We are excited to share that Topher (from TAO our new restaurant on site) and his crew are busy making masks for the community in the Dye House. They could always use more help and more supplies, so if you feel so inclined and can help out or if you have sewing supplies, you can drop them off at the dye House between Wednesday Sunday for the foreseeable future. Their goal is to make 10,000 masks. Once that happens, they will let us know how they will be distributing them for first responders, and eventually, the general public.

"I started weaving as a child in Ann Arbor, Michigan, and have pursued fiber arts as my full-time profession for more than two decades. For many years I sold my handwoven fashion accessories at juried craft shows, including ACC shows and retail craft shows in the northeast and mid-Atlantic.

I attended art school at Syracuse University and received an undergraduate degree in Anthropology from Wellesley College. This has fueled my interest in ethnic textiles and processes and has resulted in the privilege of working with and supporting contemporary weavers in Ghana and Guatemala.

Teaching in a variety of contexts has become an important part of my weaving life. In addition to working with adult learners throughout in many parts of the country and children in local schools, I teach weaving at Syracuse University. My students of all ages continue to energize and educate me."

Aqua Linked Bird's Eye


This was a runner up in a weaving competition from some "best of 4 shafts".








Nancy Leong

It was a nightmare to weave. I had to comb the thread every two inches after it was all threaded and beamed because the fuzz just kept building up. Two orphan kittens growing up fat and happy - at last they are old enough so I can sleep through the entire night!


