

#### Color News & Notes Diane Pigg



It's Spring and time to go looking for a little color! I've found a few websites worth sharing!

The <u>Pantone color of the year</u> for 2020 is CYMI\*, Classic Blue (19-4052). According to Pantone this color instills, ...*calm, confidence, and connection, this enduring blue hue highlights our desire for a* 

dependable and stable foundation on which to build as we cross the threshold into a new era. That's a lot to expect from a color, especially in an election year, but here's hoping it gives us all that, as well as weaving inspiration! At the Pantone link above, you can read a little more about the process for selecting the color of the year (*including various links to things that Pantone wants to sell*). There is a link to something useful, though: <u>Palette Exploration</u>. They have developed five color palettes that harmonize with Classic blue, and have given them evocative names like Ponder, Snorkel, Desert Twilight, Exotic Tastes, and Untraditional. Each palette includes seven additional colors, and a few color bars to show possible combination proportions for the palette.

You may have already started to see more blue items in the stores, especially home furnishings and textiles. A quick jaunt through Pottery Barn's website shows their wares styled in several blue-prominent ways. I quite like the palettes shown at this site - <u>http://www.upwhk.com/colourtrends/ss</u>. They have a few inspiration photos, color swatches, and color harmonies – potential proportions with slants toward women and men.

In case you struggle with combining colors, or just want to shake up your approach, Tien Chiu, who presented to the guild a few years ago, has an <u>online</u> <u>color course</u> called "Color Courage for Weavers". There is a charge for the course, but there's a mini-course on color that's free! She also has many <u>informative blog</u> <u>posts</u> that address color use specifically for weaving - definitely worth a read! I especially like her post, *Color Gamps & How to Use Them*. She includes some excellent ideas, and has even developed a tool for color mixing & modelling: <u>https://www.warpandweave.com/weaving-color-mixer/</u>. (*No affiliation, just a fan*). Now is a good time to try something different, either adding a new color to your stash, or by rearranging and recombining colors you already have! Don't forget <u>Design Seeds</u>. Besides their daily color palette, you can explore by individual colors - each palette includes an inspiration photo and a palette of six colors – or by



collection. Each color shows the hex code, too, so you can convert that to RGB (*search the Web for Hex to RGB for free converters – there are also Pantone to RGB converters*) and input into Fiberworks (and probably other weaving software, too). I still find it challenging to translate colors from the screen to the yarn, and vice versa – practice

does bring improvement, along with a few surprises!

## City of Eugene Community Weaving Project

The City of Eugene Art in Public Spaces wants to create a large scale Community Weaving Project that will start with the 2020 Olympic Trials in June 2020 and end with the Oregon 21 World Athletics Championships in August of 2021. Weavers and textile artists are invited to be part of this collaborative art work. An 8 ft. by 4 ft. stand will hold two tapestry looms that will be brought to community events throughout those 14 months. The woven pieces will be fastened together into one continuous textile, creating a visual record of the people, processes, places and materials that created the work. Artists are welcome to bring and use their own materials. The project will also use site specific and upcycled materials from Nike and community donations.

The purpose of the project is to highlight the diversity of artistic practices in our community, to publicize the variety of cultural events that will occur over the next year and to engage both community members and visitors in creating a collaborative artwork. \$200 is available for each event (*lasting from two to four hours*) that an artist is commissioned to attend and weave. This includes but is not limited to travel, materials and artist fee.

#### In Memoriam – Michele Wipplinger

Michele was an author, educator, master dyer, traveler, photographer, designer, consultant and owner of *Earthues*, a natural dye company. She had a passion for color and textiles which propelled her life's journey. She was one of those people who come along every once in a while who makes a big impact on the way we think about our earth. Michele was a pioneer in finding ways to make natural dyes colorfast using non-toxic natural ingredients. The search for traditional methods took her on a quest for many years through Europe, Southeast Asia, South Asia,

South America, Africa and Central Asia.

She shared her findings and recipes with the textile community through workshops, presentations and her publications: *Color Trends* and *Natural Dyes for Artisans of the Americas* and the notebooks that accompanied her workshops. In 1995 she won the United Nation's Fashion Industry and Environmental Award for environmental stewardship on the development of an ecological natural dye process for the American textile industry.

Michele's passion for tinting the world with natural color has touched so many lives throughout the world with her enthusiasm and heartfelt connection to the people she taught and learned from. Her husband, Andro, continues her legacy through *Earthues*, which works in partnership with artisans to fulfill their dreams. Michele has left us with an example of an active, purposeful life, full of curiosity, creativity, warmth, and joy. We could best honor her life by following her lead.

#### **STUDY GROUPS**

#### Natural Dye and Ethnic Textile Study Group

This group is dedicated to the use of natural dyes on natural fibers suitable for weaving, with an emphasis on locally available, organic, and sustainable dyestuffs. Our explorations include dyeing on yarn and cloth and traditional ethnic dye techniques of shibori, ikat, and katazome. Meeting times vary and attendance in this study group is limited by the size of the dye studio. It usually meets on the third Friday at a private dye studio. Current projects include growing indigo, sponsoring a dye garden at the Extension Center, color experiments, and garment construction. In July the study group visited Jordan Schnitzer Museum of Art. The curator of Asian textiles selected a group of traditional Japanese naturally dyed textiles for the dye group to study and appreciate. #### Fiber Challenge Study Group

The Fiber Challenge Study Group is inclusive of all fiber arts, including weaving, braiding, dyeing and printing, felting, sewing and stitching, spinning, knitting, crochet, macramé, and book and paper making. At the beginning of each calendar year we choose a new topic to address in any of these techniques. During meetings we share both our work and research on the topic, as well as any other work that we have been doing. During 2020 our dual topic will be, (1) recycling, upcycling, mixed media and (2) more than one layer to create a 3-dimensional object. #### Weave Structures Study Group (WSSG)

WSSG is a learning community devoted to broadening the understanding of weave structures through education, practice, and group sharing. The group's current focus is on doubleweave. We meet at ETC at 10am on the first Saturday of every month to allow those unable to attend the regular Monday Guild meetings to participate in guild activities. #### Scandinavian Weaves Study Group (SCAN)

This group studies the weaving traditions of the Scandinavian countries - Denmark, Iceland, Norway, and Sweden - their neighbor Finland, and the Sami, the indigenous peoples of northern Scandinavia and Russia. Members explore, and share what they learn, about Scandinavian weaving techniques and structures. Weave structures include Finn weave (doubleweave pickup), Jamtlandsvav (crackle), Krokbragd, and Ripsmatta (rep weave). Besides jack and countermarche looms, members weave with Bandgrind (rigid heddle looms) and twine with cards. We meet at ETC at 10:30 on the second Thursday of the month.
