

Sharon has been interested in weaving for more than 30 years, but didn't have time to focus on learning it while still working. She did, however, learn to knit and crochet. And she began collecting yarn. Lots of yarn. When Tom and Sharon retired and moved from the Washington, D.C. area to Oregon 4 years ago, they decided to learn to weave.

Tom hoped that weaving would solve the problem of the sizable yarn stash

Sharon had acquired. They eventually discovered ETC where they took a beginning weaving course 2 years ago. They immediately bought 2 looms and have been experimenting with the various weave structures (huck lace, overshot, rep) and the Baltic pickup on the inkle loom. And that stash continues to grow.

November Program: Annin Barrett

Timberline Lodge built on Mt. Hood, 1936-37 during the Great Depression, is one of Oregon's best-loved buildings. It is widely revered for its handcrafted textile work including handwoven upholstery and drapery fabrics, hand-hooked rugs, and hand-stitched appliqué curtains. As a weaver and designer for the Timberline Textile Restoration Project beginning in 1976, Annin Barrett will tell the little-known backstory about the inspirations, choices and constraints that go into the textile restoration of this living museum. Her presentation looks at how Timberline Lodge's handcrafted fabrics have evolved over the past 80 years in some surprising ways to remain true to the spirit of the original designs.

October Program Review: Tom Knisely

Tom Knisely gave an informative and entertaining presentation about weaving rag rugs. Tom's parents were antique buyers. At age 14, Tom decided he was going to buy a spinning wheel. The dealer he bought the wheel from recommended that he go to *The Mannings* where he could learn spinning. So there he went and spent the next 40 years as an employee.

After the spinning wheel, Tom saved for a loom and bought a huge barn loom with two shafts. Someone recommended that he weave rugs, so he did. He started collecting "rainbow carpets", which have a plain background with bright bold stripes. Once he started weaving rag rugs, he had many donations of "rags". As he went along he started to do log cabin pattern because it made the design more interesting. His talk was filled with lots of practical information and there were many questions afterwards. Thank you Tom for a really worthwhile presentation.

Tom's latest book is one for children: A Weaver's Surprise.

Planning for the Guild's 75th Anniversary

Open Show Schedule: The show will be at ETC and run from *June 1 to July 31*, *2021*.

Fall 2020: Submit paper work for each entry. Include final size and hanging requirements and a digital image.

Jan 2021: Entries must be complete and available to be photographed

Rules: Entries must: • have been completed after 2017

- not have been previously shown
- be original work
- be ready to hang

Members may submit multiple items. The committee has the authority to limit the number of items per member. The plan is to rotate items throughout the show, depending on number of entries. A commission of 25% will be assessed on all sold items. If you have any questions or comments about the Open Show, please contact Marilyn Robert.

The Guild booth at ANWG will feature an exhibit about the history of the Guild since its beginning in 1946. It will include woven samples of historical textiles (many drafts can be found in the old sample books in our library). Weaving Guilds of Oregon (WeGO) is a state-wide collaboration of guilds that encourages weaving through education.

WEGO Meeting Report | October 2019 | Astoria, OR (Sarah Mostkoff, ANWG Rep)

WeGO has increased scholarships to \$500 per selected guild. *EWG was selected for a 2020 scholarship*. We accepted the Scholarship and will apply it to the Sakiori workshop.

If guilds are holding classes and need to have more people to register, we can contact Annali Cross and she'll post it on their WeGO's Facebook page and website.

One guild is turning their community weaving project demonstrations into hanging banners for wall art. Two were donated to Habitat for Humanity to be hung in new homes.

WeGO encourages us to enter weaving projects in **OFFF**. Only 4 entries were submitted last year. The Oregon State Fair has a new category of *Oregon Inspired Artwork* with a **\$100 awar**d.

Last year's Traveling Show had 68 pieces entered and of those, 25 sold. The next Traveling show is in 2023. Five guilds will be selected to host the show for two months each. Start planning your projects now! There are several cash awards available. Does Eugene Weavers Guild want to sponsor a gallery show in 2023? We would need a venue for two months and be responsible to set up/take down the show.

Also, WeGO is looking for a Traveling Show 2023 Chairman and committee. If you are interested in the Chairman position or being on the committee, please contact Sarah Mostkoff.

This will be the **40th year** of WeGO at ANWG.

STUDY GROUPS

Natural Dye and Ethnic Textile Study Group

This group is dedicated to the use of natural dyes on natural fibers suitable for weaving, with an emphasis on locally available, organic, and sustainable dyestuffs. Our explorations include dyeing on yarn and cloth and traditional ethnic dye techniques of shibori, ikat, and katazome. (*meeting times vary and attendance in this study group is limited by the size of the dye studio*). It usually meets on the third Friday at a private dye studio. Current projects include growing indigo, sponsoring a dye garden at the Extension Center, color experiments, and garment construction. In July the study group visited Jordan Schnitzer Museum of Art. The curator of Asian textiles selected a group of traditional Japanese naturally dyed textiles for the dye group to study and appreciate. Fiber Challenge Study Group

The Fiber Challenge Study Group is inclusive of all fiber arts, including weaving, braiding, dyeing and printing, felting, sewing and stitching, spinning, knitting, crochet, macrame, and book and paper making. At the beginning of each calendar year we choose a new topic to address in any of these techniques. During meetings we share both our work and research on the topic, as well as any other work that we have been doing. During 2019 our topic has been Curves and Spirals. Weave Structures Study Group (WSSG)

WSSG is a learning community devoted to broadening the understanding of weave structures through education, practice, and group sharing. The group's current focus is on Rep Weave, but we are in the process of transitioning to doubleweave. We meet at ETC at 10am on the first Saturday of every month to allow those unable to attend the regular Monday Guild meetings to participate in guild activities. Scandinavian Weaves Study Group (SCAN)

This group studies the weaving traditions of the Scandinavian countries -Denmark, Iceland, Norway, and Sweden - their neighbor Finland, and the Sami, the indigenous peoples of northern Scandinavia and Russia. Members explore, and share what they learn, about Scandinavian weaving techniques and structures. Weave structures include Finn weave (doubleweave pickup), Jamtlandsvav (crackle), Krokbragd, and Ripsmatta (rep weave). Besides jack and countermarche looms, members weave with Bandgrind (rigid heddle looms) and twine with cards. We meet at ETC at 10:30 on the second Thursday of the month. Inkle Weaving Study Group (new in 2019)

This group is dedicated to sharing the basics of narrow-band inkle weaving, surface design ideas, the use of supplementary heddles, and explorations of color interactions. Eugene Weavers Guild has 5 Study Groups.

The Inkle Study Group meets on the first Friday from 10am to 12noon. The Fiber Challenge group, which meets the second Monday of each month from 10am to 12noon, has been investigating spirals and curves in weaving, with a new topic to begin in December.

The Natural Dye and Ethnic study group meets on the third Friday in a home workshop, so there is an application to get in.

The Scandinavian group is now focusing on individual projects. This group studies anything and everything about the Scandinavian countries related to textiles. Meeting times: Thursdays 10:30 am - Noon

The Weave Structure Study Group is headed by Cathy Barnes and meets the first Saturday of the month from 10am to 12noon. This year the structure being studied is Doubleweave.

Save the dates June 7th to 12th, 2021. At the 2021 ANWG Conference, *Fiber Connections*, there will be plenty of opportunities to show off weaving. The location will be Willamette University, Salem, June 7-12th, 2021. ANWG preconference workshops will be June 7, 8, 9. The ANWG Conference opens

formally on June 10th, 2021. During the main part of the conference, there will be a juried show and fashion show. American designer Bonnie *Cashin's Noh* coat, as it appears in *Threads* Magazine (Oct/Nov 1990, No. 31), will be displayed at the conference. ANWG invites weavers to weave and sew their own Bonnie Cashin Noh coat for the conference. The coat is very simple and is especially suitable for handweavers who do not sew often. The coat is unlined, does not have set-in sleeves, and has binding for the edge. This means that the coat is all about the quality of the cloth.

The Eugene Weavers Guild booth at this conference will be 10' X 10' at no charge. Registration will open up online, probably January 2021, if you don't have access to a computer to register, see Karen Sieradski. ANWG is the Association of Northwest Weavers' Guilds.

WeGO is helping to sponsor a 2-day beginning Rigid Heddle Weaving Class with a choice of dates available in September and October 2020, if there is sufficient interest. Peg Silloway from Beaverton is the instructor. Four people have indicated interest.

Above The Fray presents: Village Textile tours: Hill Tribe Laos and Vietnam.

Tour Leader is Maren Beck, who for 15 years has been studying textiles and developing personal relationships in several small villages in Laos and Vietnam. Group size will be 4-8. There will be hands on workshops in Vietnam on hemp peeling, splicing and cloth preparation, wax-resist batik, fermented indigo dyeing, Hmong and Dzao traditional embroidery. In Laos workshops will include silk reeling and preparation, dyeing with fresh indigo, lac, and other locally harvested natural dye materials, cotton ginning and spinning, ikat preparation and tying, discontinuous supplemental weft weaving, traditional Katu back-strap weaving. Plus, there will be visits to museums, waterfalls, historical sites, temples, educational centers. Meals are traditional, fresh, unique and delicious. Marilyn Robert added that this year, 4 people went and had a great time.
